#### INTRODUCTION

The International Executive Council was created to function directly under the authority of the International General Assembly. Since its formation in 1917, it has lived up to its purpose.

First proposed in 1915, the Council was established in 1916 when the Assembly adopted a recommendation from the Committee on Bible Plans of Order:

...that a body of elders be selected, whose duty it shall be to have jurisdiction over all questions of every nature that may properly come before them, their actions and decisions to be ratified by the Assembly in session. This body of elders to be composed of not less than twelve members and never more than seventy... Book of Minutes 12<sup>th</sup>, p.242

The Council was authorized to carry on the business of the Church of God when no Assembly was in session. Specific among its duties was the preparation of the agenda for the next International General Assembly. Through the years many other duties have been assigned to the Council. The authority assigned to the Council by the International General Assembly distinguishes it from all other boards and committees. Attorney Dennis W. Watkins gives the following summary:

As we know, the International Executive Council is the second highest judicatory/governing body of the Church of God, subject only to the International General Assembly, and governs the Church of God between International General Assemblies.

#### RESPONSIBILITIES

Among its many responsibilities, the following are particularly important:

- To distribute the tithes that comes to International Offices.
- To intervene in difficulties involving the officials of the church.
- To estop any general official of the church for any misconduct whatsoever.
- To pass upon the budgets and fiscal affairs of all departments.
- To pass on pensions for retired ministers and assistance to the needy.
- To pass on the reinstatement of ministers whose licensure has been revoked.

The Council can and has acted upon all of these and other issues. In its function, it has faced such responsibilities as 1) an impeachment, 2) estopping in office, 3) censure, and 4) setting aside board actions that were demonstrated not to be in the best interest of the Church of God.

No member of the International Executive Council is to violate the responsibility of confidentiality regarding information disseminated in an International Executive Council meeting or in correspondence that has been designated as confidential by the General Overseer and International Executive Council. *April* 2012 International Executive Council Minutes.

The following items shall be deemed confidential:

- 1. All matters related to ministerial discipline and restoration.
- 2. All matters regarding personnel issues related to the operation of the International Offices.
- 3. The content of the debate and voting record of any member on any business brought before the International Executive Council.
- 4. Any and all matters deemed confidential by the General Overseer and/or the International Executive Council.

#### **DUTIES AND AUTHORITIES**

The present duties and authorities as listed in the *Minutes* are as follows:

- 1. This council shall consider and act upon any and all matters pertaining to the general interest and welfare of the Church of God. At a time set by the general overseer, the said council shall meet and adopt recommendations to be brought before the International General Council 56th A., 1976, p. 49, 1, 2.
- 2. All measures designed to change or alter any teaching of the Church of God, before being presented to the International General Council, shall first be submitted to the International Executive Council in writing prior to the meeting of the International General Council 45th A., 1954, p. 34 34; 49th A., 1962, p. 34 11.
- 3. All measures designed to change, alter, or delete any doctrine of the Church of God as prescribed in the *Declaration of Faith*, before being presented to the International General Assembly, shall be first submitted to the International Executive Council in writing twelve 12 months prior to the regular session of the International General Council, and must have a three-fourths majority vote to carry. The measure shall then be submitted to the International General Council for consideration, and if the International General Council approves the measure by a three-fourths vote, the International Executive Committee shall place the said measure in the *Church of God Evangel* quarterly for a study until the next regular session of the International General Assembly, thus giving the membership an opportunity to consider and vote on the said measure in the International General Assembly before it becomes a ruling 45th A., 1954, p. 34 34; 49th A., 1962, p. 34 11; 50th A., 1964, p. 50 5; p. 56 19.
- 4. The distribution of tithes sent to the International Offices of the church shall be in the hands of the general overseer and the International Executive Council 13th A., 1917, pp. 33, 40; 26th A., 1931, p. 104 2; 33rd A., 1938, p. 51 4; 39th A., 1944, p. 38 1; 42nd A., 1948, p. 29; 50th A., 1964, p. 50 5; p. 56 19.
- 5. Matters which concern difficulties or measures relating to one or more of the general officials shall be referred to the Council of Eighteen for decision (see S6. V. Discipline).
- 6. Its duty shall be to counsel with the general overseer in all matters pertaining to the general interest of the church. This body of men, or a majority of the same, shall have power to stop any general official of the Church of God for any misconduct, until proper procedures have been followed 64th. A., 1992, p. 87.

- 7. The general overseer, with the International Executive Council, shall give one of his assistants the World Missions portfolio and assign his duties and authorities 52<sup>nd</sup> A., 1968, p. 34.
- 8. The International Executive Council shall meet every two years with the International Council to discuss and project international ministries Proverbs 11:14 59th A., 1982, p. 32.
- 9. Allotments for aged and disabled ministers shall be determined by the International Executive Council.
- 10. Ministers' credentials having been revoked for the cause of improper conduct with the opposite sex, shall not be restored to them until approved by a three-fourths majority vote of the International Executive Council 42<sup>nd</sup> A., 1948, p. 29; 65<sup>th</sup> A., 1994, Item 16, p. 91.
- 11. Permission to establish an institution of higher education, that is, a Bible college or a liberal arts college, shall be granted by the International Executive Council 56th A., 1976, p. 54.
- 12. The International Executive Council shall be authorized to establish a loan fund to provide interim financing for churches in new fields 53<sup>rd</sup> A., 1970, p. 58, 19B.
- 13. The International Executive Council is authorized to initiate a radio and television program in the interest of the Church of God 46th A., 1956, p. 30.
- 14. Because both public and private schools are adjusting their schedules to begin the first week of August in most states, consideration should be made to holding the General Assembly no later than the last week of July. This would help parents of school-age children, ministers' wives who teach school, as well as Teen Talent participants to not miss the first days of school 70th A., 2004 p. 57.
- 15. The International Executive Council is authorized to reorganize, amplify, and clarify as necessary all information in the International General Assembly *Minutes* pertaining to property ownership and the various boards of trustees. It is understood that no changes will be made in the intent of the measures, only rearrangement and updating. Further, the International Executive Council shall make this material in its reorganized form available to every pastor and ordained bishop as soon as possible following the International General Assembly 65th A.,1994, Item 8, p. 89.
- 16. Whereas the Church of God is an international church serving in many nations, societies and cultures; and words may not always convey the same meaning nor the same level of social and cultural appropriateness in these various settings,

Therefore, the International Executive Council is authorized to reword information in the International General Assembly *Minutes* to clarify its meaning and protect its social and cultural appropriateness. It is understood that no changes will be made in the intent or essence of the measures.

Further, the International Executive Council is authorized to commission the preparation of an international version of the International General Assembly Minutes that takes into consideration the differences in laws and customs between the United States of America and other countries 67th A., 1998, pp. 52, 53.

- 17. The initial structure of a U.S.A. National Council/Assembly shall be the same as the International General Council/Assembly, and the International Executive Council shall schedule time for business unique to the United States of America to be handled during the week of the International General Assembly. 71st A., 2006, pp. 46,47.
- 18. All business before the International Executive Council between assemblies

concluded and decided be made available to all credentialed ministers through the ministerial reporting website. Any disciplinary actions will not be included. 75th A.,2014, p. 72, S5

# DISCIPLINE OF A MEMBER OF THE INTERNATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1992 International General Assembly

- 1. Procedures concerning an International Executive Committee member who has been accused of any misconduct shall become the responsibility of the Council of Eighteen, called into executive session and moderated by the first elected member.
- 2. If the Council of Eighteen feels there is reason to do so, an investigative committee shall be selected from the Council of Eighteen to inquire into any formal charge of misconduct.
- 3. The Council of Eighteen shall then consider the findings of the investigative committee.
- 4. Once charges have been filed, the said International Executive Committee member shall be relieved of all responsibilities but retain his salary and benefits until the matter has been resolved.
- 5. If the Council of Eighteen agrees that the findings of the investigative committee warrant charges being filed, a trial board shall be appointed by the council to hear the charges.
- 6. Any appeal of the decision of the trial board must be presented to the chairman of the Council of Eighteen in writing within 10 days of receiving the written notification of the trial board's decision.
- 7. If granted by a majority vote of the Council of Eighteen, a board of appeal shall be appointed by the Council of Eighteen. Members of the investigative committee and trial board shall be ineligible to serve.
- 8. If the appeal board sustains the guilty verdict, the member shall be removed immediately and the filling of the vacancy shall proceed as provided for in the *International General Assembly Minutes*.
- 9. If the offense warrants such action, the chairman of the Council of Eighteen shall notify the respective state overseer to sign the termination of credentials form.

#### INTERNATIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

#### NAME

2000 International General Assembly

"That we amend p. 126 S3. General Council, V. Bylaws, Article I, by inserting the word 'International' before the words 'Executive Council."

#### **SELECTION**

2002 International General Assembly

The International Executive Council is comprised of the International Executive Committee and eighteen (18) elected members. Not less than nine (9) members shall be pastors at the time of their election. Further, two (2) members of the Council of Eighteen shall be at the time of their election, foreign nationals residing and ministering outside the U.S.A. No member of the International Executive Committee who has just completed his tenure of office shall be eligible to serve on the International Executive Council for the ensuing International General Assembly term.

#### PROCEDURE FOR FILLING VACANCIES

2006 International General Assembly

Should any one of the 18 positions on the Council of Eighteen be vacated because of death, disability, advancement, resignation or the member in any wise being disqualified, the General Overseer shall submit to the International Executive Council in session the names of the next two men receiving the highest votes on previous ballots who are eligible at the time of this special election and whose election would retain the required minimum numbers of pastors and/or foreign nationals as required by the International General Assembly *Minutes*. The one receiving the majority vote of the International Executive Council shall be declared elected to fill the unexpired term. If more than one half of the vacated term remains, the member elected to fill that term will be eligible to succeed himself for only one additional term. If a vacancy occurs after April 1 of a General Assembly year, that vacancy will not be filled.

#### STANDING BOARD MEMBERSHIP

2004 International General Assembly

When an individual is appointed as an Administrative Bishop [state overseer] and then elected to the Council of Eighteen, he is not eligible for appointment to serve on a standing board.

#### ORDER AND DECORUM

The Council follows specific rules of order that have developed through its history. The general overseer is the sole chairman of the combined International Executive Committee and Council of Eighteen, which joint session constitutes the International Executive Council. Under emergency conditions, three members of the Council can, by petition, call a meeting of the ministry.

The Council, being a small deliberative body, functions in a relaxed and collegial atmosphere. Parliamentary procedures are not rigidly followed so long as a "gentlemen's agreement" is

more productive and harmonious. Upon any member's call to order, the Council instantly becomes rigid in its business.

Attendance at all meetings of every session is required of all members. This has been historically observed, except in cases of illness and emergency. Even then, the member is expected to be present when possible.

The same attention to schedule has been an historic practice of the Council. Throughout its history, the Council has endeavored to adhere precisely to the printed schedule.

Decorum in dress has always been observed by the Council. Due to the nature of its work, only attire that is appropriate at General Assemblies or in clerical functions has been regarded as appropriate for the Council in session. Lounging and casual dress is disallowed. The Council functions between the International General Assemblies, and the members are expected to be conscious of that fact in all deportment and attitudes.

#### APPROVAL OF INTERNATIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MINUTES

The minutes of each session of the International Executive Council are processed and approved by the General Overseer and Secretary General on behalf of the Council. A copy of the minutes from each session is mailed to all members.

# THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL

2000 International General Assembly

#### **PURPOSE**

To give greater involvement in order to support continued development of an international perspective in fulfilling the mission of the Church of God, and to ensure the sponsorship of ministries that meet the needs of persons of different cultural settings, the church must embrace a posture that includes both participation and representation in its general functions (Matthew 28:1 9; Mark 16:15; Acts 15:1-21). This posture should include specialized training programs and materials, opportunities for leadership experience, and open channels for new ideas. It should also provide a forum to discuss International General Council agenda items of concern to the international community and give opportunity for raising international issues for discussion.

#### **MEMBERS**

The International Council is composed of the following:

- 1. International Executive Committee
- 2. Director and assistant director of World Missions
- 3. Moderator of Southern Africa
- 4. Overseer of Indonesia

- 5. Two members (ordained), at least one being African American and one Hispanic from the U.S.A., appointed by the International Executive Committee in consultation with the leadership of World Missions.
- 6. The Field Director and one selected representative (ordained bishop) from each of the following areas:
  - Africa: Northern & Central
  - Asia-Pacific
  - Canada
  - Caribbean
  - Latin America-Mexico-Central America-Brazil-South America
  - Europe: Central-Eastern-CIS
  - Europe: Western-Mediterranean-Middle East
- 7. Others as approved by the International Executive Council. (The manner of the selection of representatives is determined by each specific region which would be responsible for the travel expenses of its representative.)

#### **MEETINGS**

- 1. Meetings shall be moderated by the general overseer.
- 2. This council shall meet at least once every two years to provide input on an advisory basis to the International Executive Council on international issues and items of international interest for the agenda of the International General Council.
- 3. It shall meet prior to and with the International Executive Council on related international issues in the September of the off-Assembly years.

#### **FUNCTION**

The function of the International Council shall be to advise the International Executive Council on issues of international concern and to suggest possible items related to ministry in the international community for inclusion on the agenda of the International General Council.

# EMPLOYMENT & SCHOOL ATTENDANCE OF ELECTED OR APPOINTED PERSONS

May 1968

That all elected officials, appointed department heads, associate department heads, and state overseers must have International Executive Committee approval to attend school, accept employment, or be self-employed for financial remuneration.

That this information be given to all Ordained Bishops by the general overseer as an action of the International Executive Council.

#### **CONFLICTS OF INTEREST**

May 1968, January 2011

That no employee or official of the international offices be allowed to own stock or have any interest, either directly or indirectly, with any company which does business with the international offices.

Further, if any such condition be found to exist, presently or in the future, that the person or persons involved be allowed the choice of completely disassociating himself with the enterprise within a period of 90 days or be relieved of his duties with the church.

# DEFINITIVE STATEMENT ON PERSONNEL EDUCATION OR EMPLOYMENT

September 1971, January 2011

That all individuals who are appointed or elected by the International General Assembly, International Executive Council, or the International Executive Committee be required to have International Executive Committee approval to attend school.

That the International Executive Committee be empowered to evaluate the workload of any elected or appointed person in order to ascertain the number of hours he or she could be permitted to attend school.

That no one be allowed to continue in school or college when the work for which he is responsible is declining.

Employment is that which engages or occupies a person's time and attention. It is an occupation.

Earnings from rentals, investments, savings bonds or gospel writings for the church are not interpreted as employment, unless it takes one from the duties involved in the business of his office, to which he has been elected or appointed, and the work for which he is responsible is neglected and not progressing.

The apostolic admonition is 2 TIMOTHY 2:4 - No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life; that he may please him who hath chosen him to be a soldier.

### REQUESTS TO APPEAR PERSONALLY BEFORE THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

If a minister makes a request to appear before the International Executive Council, the request shall be made in writing through the office of the general overseer, who will present it to the International Executive Council for its consideration and decision.

# PAYMENT OF TITHES BY CREDENTIALED MINISTERS IN CHURCH OF GOD SCHOOLS

September 1969, January 2011

Credentialed ministers employed in non-pulpit positions shall receive their compensation as being paid from the Tithe Fund; therefore, credentialed ministers holding positions as teachers in all Church of God schools and colleges shall report their salary as income from the ministry.

# **LOAN POLICIES**

# CRITERIA FOR STATE UNDERWRITING AT LOCAL BANKS

May 1986

It is the general policy of the Council that if a state does not meet the requirement to bring delinquent payments up to date, no further loans shall be made to that state until all delinquent loan payments are brought up to date.

- 1. All criteria for Aged Ministers loans be applicable to loans from local lending institutions. Requirements are as follows:
  - Trust Deed or Mortgage
  - Promissory Note
  - Mortgage Title Insurance Policy
  - Copy of Warranty Deed
  - Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance Policy
  - Personal Liability Insurance Policy
- 2. That states be authorized to obligate themselves for local loan underwriting of not more than twenty 20 times their annual income.

## LOAN UNDERWRITING COMMITTEE OF ACTION OPERATING POLICY

April 2001

- 1. Loans are to be considered on an emergency basis.
- 2. Loans exceeding \$50,000 will be considered.
- 3. Any amount exceeding \$2 million must be approved by the International Executive Council.
- 4. All loans must comply with the criteria set by the Benefits Board.
- 5. All requests must first have the approval of the requesting entity state/regional council, department, board, etc.
- 6. The minutes of the business session approving the loan application must be submitted to the Loan Underwriting Committee of Action.
- 7. Before approving a loan, the Loan Underwriting Committee of Action shall review a summary of past transactions.
- 8. A report will be given at the next regularly scheduled International Executive Council meeting as to the action taken.
- 9. Any exceptions to this policy must be approved by the International Executive Council.

# LOAN REQUESTS FROM WORLD MISSIONS TO THE BENEFITS BOARD

January 2001

That the Church of God, Cleveland, Tennessee, acting duly through the International Executive Council, endorse and guarantee additional loan requests in the future from World Missions to the Benefits Board up to a total amount not to exceed \$15 million, subject to such requests conforming to all the requirements of World Missions and the loan requirements of the Benefits Board, and:

That the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Benefits Board and the Director of World Missions regularly advise, not less than annually, the International Executive Council of any and all loans outstanding between the Benefits Board and World Missions subject to this endorsement and guarantee.

#### REINSTATEMENT TO THE MINISTRY

January 1972, January 2011

That those whose applications or requests for reinstatement to the ministry who have been declined by the International Executive Council not be given another audience by the Council until the Council discusses the proposition with new facts and extends an invitation.

#### REINSTATEMENT COMMITTEE

January 1979

That a committee of five serves as a committee of the International Executive Council for the purpose of meeting with applicants for reinstatement to the ministry prior to each Council meeting. By virtue of his office, the Ministerial Advocate shall serve as chairman of the committee; four members shall be elected by the International Executive Council. Said committee shall make a thorough inquiry into the worthiness of the applicant for reinstatement, and make its report to the Council, which shall, after further interview of the applicant, if it so desires, take action upon the applicant's appeal for reinstatement.

#### **EXPENSE POLICY FOR COUNCIL MEETINGS**

January 2020

The International Executive Committee and the general church appreciate your work and your commitment to this council. The following policy is provided to assist you in filling out the expense sheet.

Automobile – \$.50 per mile

Lodging – Actual expenses (receipt required)

Councilors staying at the Holiday Inn Express, Fairfield Inn or Hampton Inn may have their lodging direct billed to the International Offices. All incidental charges must be paid by the councilor.

Councilors who live out of town not staying in a hotel/motel who provide their own housing may claim \$65 per day for lodging (September 2013 International Executive Council Minutes)

Airfare - Actual expense (receipt required)

Food - Up to \$32 per day. If meals are charged to the room, per diem cannot be requested on the Travel Expense Voucher.

Miscellaneous – All expenses for parking, tips, etc. (receipt required)

Car Rentals – For actual days of Executive Council session (receipt required)

Retired Minister/Evangelist Honorarium - \$750 per session

Stipend - A \$35 per day stipend is given Executive Council members in recognition for the time they spend in sessions and assigned subcommittee meetings. The International Executive Committee is to also receive this stipend. (This is limited to the number of days the council is actually in session plus any days in committee meetings. Travel days are excluded.) (April 2001 International Executive Council Minutes)

Your wife is welcome to accompany you to Cleveland, and the general church will assume actual expenses for her provided she participates in appropriate activities. This does not include a second airfare (food and lodging only).

#### TRAVEL EXPENSE – MILEAGE RATE

January 2004, January 2013

That the mileage allotment for those who travel in the general interest of the church would be set at no more than \$.50 per mile. (Note: The intention of this measure is that this adjustment will be made annually and that International Executive Council action will not be required.)

#### LETTER TO RETIRING MINISTERS

May 1982

That a letter of appreciation for his years of ministry be sent from the International Executive Council to each minister at the time of his retirement.

#### **BUDGET REVIEW COMMITTEE**

January 1983, September 2014

That a Budget Review Committee of five members including the Secretary General from the Council be appointed to review all budgets annually before they are presented to the International Executive Council in their April session. The annual budget review will include receipt of a report from divisions detailing how their budget reflects and has achieved the objective of contributing to the mission, vision and commitments/core values of the international church and that report be made available to the Budge Review Committee and the International Executive Council.

#### **SUMMARY FINANCIAL**

January 1986

That the Secretary General prepares a summary financial statement presentation for the outset of each International Executive Council session. Further, that this statement include current receipts, expenditures, and balances in all funds.

#### ATTORNEY/CLIENT PRIVILEGE

Under certain circumstances, it may be necessary for the members of the International Executive Council, which includes the International Executive Committee, to be able to discuss matters under the attorney/client privilege. At such time as this is deemed necessary, legal counsel should be asked to join in the meetings in order to protect this privilege.

#### FACTS ABOUT THE INTERNATIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

#### Instituted in November, 1916

"Moved that a body of elders be selected, whose duty it shall be to have jurisdiction over all questions of every nature that may properly come before them, their actions and decisions to be ratified by the Assembly in session. This body of elders to be composed of not less than twelve members and never more than seventy."--Book of Minutes 12th, 1916 p.242

#### Selection of Councilors

The selection of the first Council was a long, drawn-out procedure that required more than two weeks February 13-March 1, 1917 for completion. The general overseer and the councilors themselves joined in the selective process.

### First Meeting of the Council October 4-17, 1917

The First Councilors: General Overseer A.J. Tomlinson, plus the Council of Twelve: F.J. Lee, T.L. McLain, T.S. Payne, M.S. Lemons, J.B. Ellis, Sam C. Perry, M.S. Haynes, George T. Brouayer, S.W. Latimer, E.J. Boehmer, S.O. Gillaspie, and J.S. Llewellyn.

#### Methods of Selection

The first Council was appointed; thereafter, through 1929, the Councilors and members of the Executive Committee except the general overseer, who was selected for life in 1914 were nominated by an early form of the General Council and elected by the General Assembly. Since 1930, the Council of Twelve or Council of Eighteen has been elected by the General Council. Serving with the Executive Committee, it was called the Supreme Council until 1964, when the name Executive Council was adopted. The name "International Executive Council" was adopted by the 2000 Assembly.

For six years, 1926-1932, the Council of Twelve served with the general overseer as the Executive Committee, or State Overseer Appointing Board.

Until 1986, there was no change in the number on the Council of Twelve, but the size of the joint Supreme/Executive Council changed frequently because the Executive Committee has varied from 3 to 7 members.

In 1986, the Council of Twelve was expanded to eighteen members, as the Council of Eighteen.

#### Fathers and Sons

Eight fathers and ten sons have served on the Council: M.S. Lemons -- Frank W. Lemons; David L. Lemons J.B. Ellis -- E.M. Ellis E.W. Williams -- Ralph E. Williams Paul H. Walker -- Paul L. #### Vacancies

As with the methods of selection, vacancies on the Council have come in various ways. The

most common has been through fortunes of the election process. Some have withdrawn from election after they were nominated, but these personal withdrawals created no vacancy. In 1988, J. Herbert Walker, Jr. was elected to the Council but resigned while still at the Assembly in order to accept the presidency of the School of Theology, and another nominee was chosen.

- 1. Two members of the Council George T. Brouayer and S.O. Gillaspie were dismissed with A.J. Tomlinson when he was impeached in 1923.
- 2. Eight members of the International Executive Council have died in office:

- 3. In 1989, Cecil B. Knight, Assistant General Overseer, resigned from the International Executive Committee and International Executive Council in order to become President of the School of Theology, an office recently vacated by the death of President J. Herbert Walker, Jr.
- 4. Larry McDaniel's credentials were revoked on August 4, 1993 and therefore he did not complete the term.
- 5. Robert White, General Overseer, was estopped by the International Executive Council on July 17, 1996. The International Executive Committee functioned with four members until the International General Assembly.
- 6. In 1998 Danny May surrendered his credentials and did not fulfill the remainder of the 1996-98 term.
- 7. In 1999 the credentials of Joe Jackson were revoked which created a vacancy on the Council.
- 8. General Overseer Carroll and Assistant General Overseer Knight were replaced on the Council, but that was because of their positions on the International Executive Committee. At that time, no procedure had been devised for the replacement of a member of the Council of Eighteen.

## INTERNATIONAL REPRESENTATION

#### **South Africa**

Since 1951, the Moderator of the Full Gospel Church of God, South Africa, has been a member of the International Executive Council:

In accordance with the memorandum of agreement, the President of the Full Gospel Church of God, South Africa, shall be a member of the International Executive Council of the Church of God in America, and the general overseer of the Church of God shall be a member of the Executive Council of the Full Gospel Church of God in South Africa. 46th A, 1956, p.28 (47)

During the January 2007 session of the International Executive Council, the Moderator of the Full Gospel Church of God, South Africa, requested that he attend only the September session

each year. This request was approved.

#### Indonesia

The International Executive Council, in January 1999, reviewed representation of the Indonesian church on the International Executive Council. That [the National Overseer of Indonesia] would attend the September session of the International Executive Council each year.
